Description: Health care settings are key to the provision of trauma-sensitive identification and response for survivors of human trafficking. This two-part webinar series is intended to strengthen the ability of healthcare providers, mental health providers, social workers, legal professionals, and survivor advocates to identify and respond to at-risk and affected individuals, and to work collaboratively both within and beyond the health care setting, using principles of trauma-informed care on both individual and institutional/system levels.

Webinar 1 will provide an overview of human trafficking, offer tools for identifying survivors in healthcare settings, discuss strategies for responding to disclosure, and introduce principles of trauma-informed response. **Webinar 2** will provide insights about systems impacting survivors – focusing on legal, mental health, and social services, with emphasis on developing strategies for identifying and building inter-professional networks across these systems.

Objectives

By the end of this webinar, participants will be better able to:

- Describe the scope, presentation(s), and health effects of human trafficking
- Outline strategies for trauma-informed identification and response in the health setting
- Articulate reporting, mental health, social welfare, and safety considerations
- Describe legal processes for immigration relief, civil litigation, and criminal prosecution
- Articulate how a trauma-informed approach can be used in legal, advocacy, and case management settings
- Identify ways engaged communities can collaborate to promote prevention
- Foster passion for ongoing education, networking, and leadership
